SMALL STEPS TO SUCCESS – PROGRAM DELIVERY GUIDE

Widespread Community Consultation – Seek Out Local Problems and Local Solutions as far as it relates to program delivery

Strategic Planning and Development is critical

Recognize the traditional and cultural values within the region and incorporate in program where applicable

Create a model to ensure quality control across the whole program

Deliver a pilot that incorporates program and partners outcomes and messages

Identify and Develop Program Partnerships to assist in program delivery

Built in the capacity to educate and train local people to deliver the program

Build in flexibility to meet community needs

Support delivery flexibility but identify limitations to ensure delivery consistency and quality control

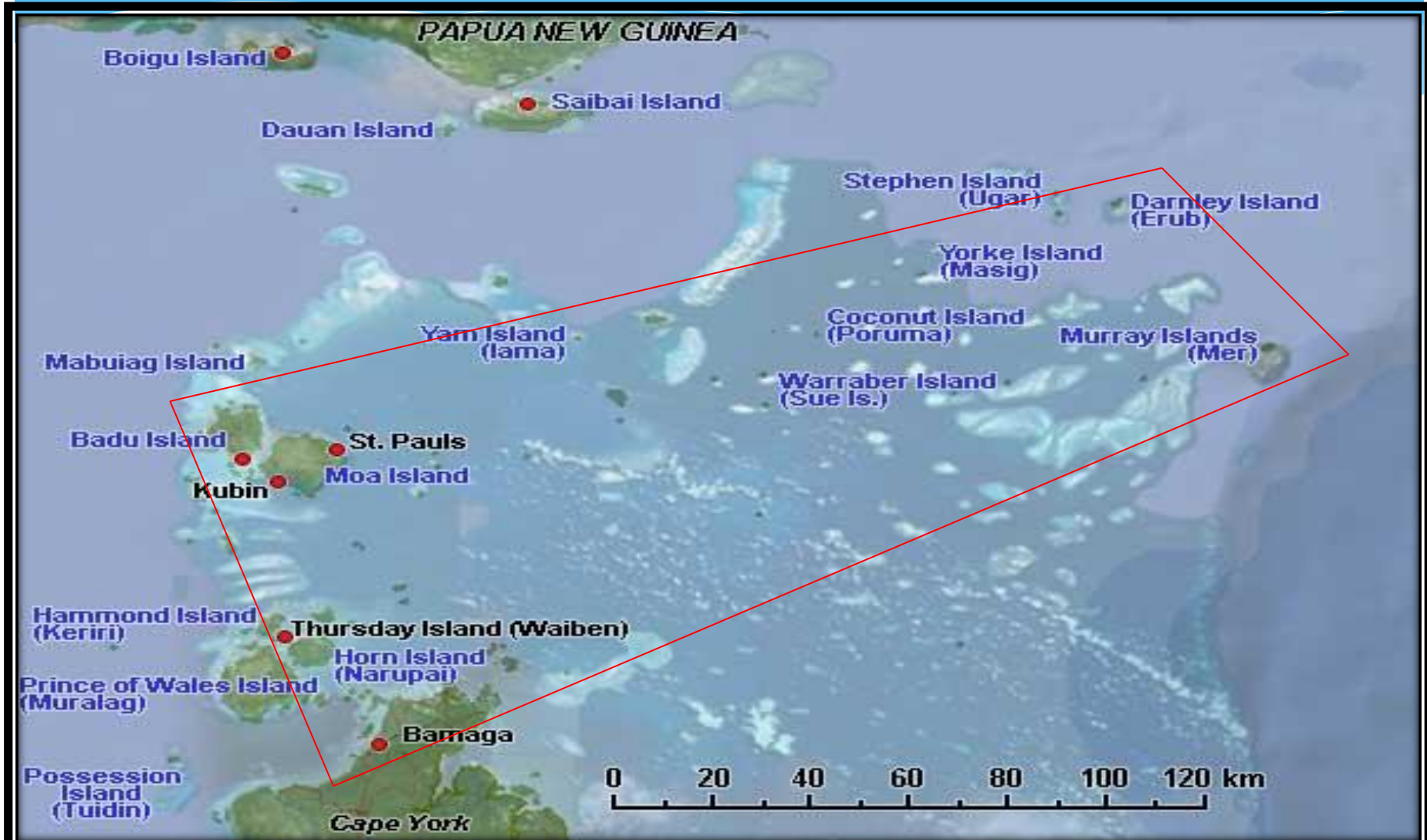
On going reviews and Include Community Workshops to challenge the program strategies, plans and models to ensure ongoing relevance to community needs

Add Pathway Programs to provide the opportunity for future advancement

Develop Effective communication processes to facilitate clear directions amongst partners

TORRES STRAIT REGION and NPA



ABOUT THE TORRES STRAIT

- * 274 small [islands](#) which lie in [Torres Strait](#), the waterway separating far northern continental Australia's [Cape York Peninsula](#) and the island of [New Guinea](#).
- * The islands are mostly part of [Queensland](#), a constituent State of the [Commonwealth of Australia](#), with a special status fitting the native ([Melanesian](#)) land rights, administered by the [Torres Strait Regional Authority](#).
- * Only 14 of the islands are inhabited. The Torres Strait Islands are threatened by rising sea levels due to [climate change](#).
- * The islands are distributed across an area of some 48 000 km². The distance across the Strait from Cape York to New Guinea is approximately 150 km at the narrowest point; the islands lie scattered in between, extending some 200–300 km from furthest east to furthest west. The total land area of the islands is 566 km²
- * NPA HAS 5 COMMUNITIES AND INCORPORATES ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLAND COMMUNITIES AND CULTURES
